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An Emerging Vision for 2010 and Beyond

As you read this article, the year 2010 is here, and with this, the opportunity to align ourselves with the magnificence of our ever-expanding Universe! Yes, the Universe *is* expanding and so is our understanding of our place in it. What does it mean to align ourselves with the Universe? How can human beings do that?

Cosmologist Brian Swimme has creatively explained this in his 11-part DVD series, "The Powers of the Universe." So, since this is a new year, let's take this opportunity to explore one—the Power of Emergence—and see, through Brian's vision, how we humans are intimately connected in this process.

In this 14.7 billion-year history of the Universe, there were many "emergences" of epochal proportions. However, I'd like to describe three of the most amazing emergences: Carbon, Earth and the Human.

First, Carbon! At a particular moment in a star's life, the center became so hot that the hydrogen and helium were both consumed, causing the star to implode. Then the inner temperature soared to 100 million degrees. At this

point the helium nuclei fused into Carbon—the basis of all life. As the supernovas exploded, the Carbon flooded the Universe, impacting all future existence. This Power of Emergence that brought forth the Carbon elements operates in *our* very bodies!

Second, the emergence of Earth! As the early planets assembled themselves 4.5 billion years ago, smaller ones—Mars and Mercury—hardened. Larger planets, like Jupiter and Saturn, remained turbulent and gaseous. But Earth's Emergence was so amazing: it was between the extremes—it had a hot, molten core, yet a cooled, crusty surface, AND there was movement! Magma in the core continued to bubble up forming more crust; mountains arose; tectonic plates shifted. Earth, in its stage of *in-between*, came alive! Jupiter was too chaotic, Mercury too rigid.

What great Mystery! Out of Earth, churning with molten rock, emerged delicate butterflies, playful otters, colorful flowers and great whales! Out of ROCK has emerged such astounding *diversity*, such deep *interiority*, and—as we learn more about our DNA—such profound *communion* with all living beings! This same Emergent Power that brought all this forth elicits the <u>uniqueness</u> of every human being!

Third, as the Power of Emergence continued in the evolution of Earth, it brought forth—from the same stardust and light en-

ergy—the two-legged beings who would gradually awaken, see, and feel awe... and wonder at the Mystery of Life. From the stuff of Earth emerged hunters and gatherers, those who drew on cave walls, Jesus, Galileo, Einstein, Gandhi, Teilhard de Chardin, Rachel Carson, Martin Luther King, Jr., Thomas Berry, Edwin Hubble, Joanna Macy, Brian Swimme and so many more whose courage, energy, love and vision have profoundly influenced humankind. This Power of Emergence also calls us to awaken



to the meaning of our lives.

The creativity of the Universe is awesome! And this "creativity"—a word that we've only recently applied to our Universe—has taken place without hands or brains! However, it was *self-reflective* humans who perceived the Universe as "a single, multiform energetic unfolding of matter, mind, intelligence and life." The Universe is filled with Creativity, with Emergence, and so are we! So how can we participate with this Cosmological Power of Emergence in 2010?

Brian Swimme suggests, first, that we begin with **the idea** that we are engulfed with creativity! Because we are rooted in the very *fireball* of the Big Bang, we **are** creativity in the form of the human. When it was "time" for the galaxies to appear, they





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did. If we hold the idea of being *engulfed in creativity*, at the right moment it will become clear just what our creative endeavor will be.

Second, we need the courage to live with ambiguity, the tension of "in-between," groping, being confused... But out of this *abiding-with*, the Universe brought forth Carbon, Earth, and the Human. There may not be "quick solutions" for us either, but we are called to do our part to creatively resolve tensions and enhance life.

Third, those drawn to the path of Emergence will sense that "there's more to be done." This restlessness-within is a personal invitation from the Universe to participate in bringing forth a new era. *Cherish restlessness!* You now know yourself to be *one-with* with the Power of Emergence!

The Universe has been aiming at **vibrant life** all along! The Power of Emergence is coming alive in the souls and psyches of humans, in those who believe in the Power of Possibility. These are persons of Cosmic faith who know deeply, intuitively, that even within the suffering and chaos that are present in our Earth community today, there, too, is the potential for creative resolution.

As we ponder the long line of ancestors who emerged from Earth—those saints, scientists, mystics and visionaries on whose shoulders we stand—we discover the truth of Darwin's statement: "It is not the strongest of the species that survive, nor the most intelligent, but the ones most responsive to change."
